WRIG 2015 Season Field Work

Our field crew was able to accomplish an incredible amount of restoration and enhancement work in our watershed over the 10 week field season this summer. Here is a summary of the work they completed:

- 852 tree and shrub species native to PEI were planted by staff and volunteers throughout the watershed
- Debris and blockages were cleared from 5.2 kilometers of our streams enabling fish passage
- 5 major blockages were removed with the use of a chainsaw
- 8 brush mats were built to trap sediment; 3 on the main branch of Hornes Creek and 5 on the main branch of Wheatley River
- 10.1 kilometers of Riparian Health Assessments were completed, providing information that can be used to guide future enhancement work
- Rackham's Community Pond was maintained for public enjoyment
- 6 wood duck nesting boxes were placed along waterways in the Wheatley River and surrounding watersheds
- Shoreline cleanups took place on the Barachois Beach and east of the Oyster Bed Causeway

We are incredibly grateful for the time our field crew spent with us—as returning staff their experience and knowledge was invaluable.

WRIG would like to acknowledge the funding programs that make these positions possible: Canada Summer Jobs, the Jobs for Youth Program, the Wildlife Conservation Fund, and the Watershed Management Fund. We would also like express our appreciation for the Hunter-Clyde Watershed Group along with the other watershed groups that we've had the privilege of working with on various projects and the community members and volunteers that provide crucial support necessary for carrying out the stream enhancement and

habitat protection work WRIG does throughout the summer season.

One chilly afternoon in late October, friends of Jack Hanley gathered at Rackham's pond to remember him. Jack, a long-time resident of Wheatley River had passed away in December 2013, but this gathering brought together many residents, neighbours and family to view a beautiful octagonal

bench built in his memory with an oak tree planted within. Despite the chill in the air, many warm words were shared about Jack. How could the memories be anything but fond when speaking of such a generous and likeable character? Steve Lowe spoke from the Wheatley River watershed group and Kathy Kiely, Jack's sister, was on hand from Massachusetts to meet all who attended. Stories of Jack's dogs, his ever giving nature and love of PEI were told, as well as his life's experiences fighting in the Vietnam War, working as a Boston fire chief, and battling cancer. My own memories of Jack would include his hand waving out the window of his truck at us, every time he drove up his driveway, and the way he always brought my children Christmas presents which we had just opened when we received the

sad news that he had suddenly passed away. Or when we were travelling to Boston for the first time and he urged us, if we felt lost or at loose ends, to just 'pop' into a firehall and introduce ourselves as friends of his, and the firefighters would be sure to look after us!

After the memorial at Rackham's pond, a reception was held at the Wheatley River Hall, catered by Green Island Catering (Jennifer and Mike Levy, Rusticoville) who provided delicious food and desserts. As I looked around the room, I couldn't help but think that Jack would be looking down on us and smiling. In this busy time, it is rare to pause and take time to visit with one's neighbours. I saw people I hadn't seen in years, met several new friends and put faces to names of people I had never met in person. Although we have lived in Wheatley River for 8 years, this was the first time I felt truly 'at home' in this community. I think Jack would be glad of this final 'gift' that he was giving

to all of us. Life is short, as Jack's passing showed us, and soon we will all 'gather at the river' – hope to see you again, neighbour.


Camp Abegweit Living Shoreline Project

Augustine Cove/Cape Traverse (AC-CT) Watershed Group in partnership with South Shore Watershed Association and Camp Abegweit contracted Nova Scotia's Helping Nature Heal Inc. (experts in Living Shoreline restoration; www.helpingnatureheal.com) to tackle an erosion issue at Camp Abegweit. HNH provided valuable people power and guidance to work with volunteers from the neighbourhood, UPEI Climate Lab, BBEMA, WRIG and several other watershed groups to build an 'installation' to

enhance approximately 450' of shoreline at the camp*. One of the values of this site is the ability to compare and contrast the effectiveness of hardscaping (using rock to prevent erosion) with a Living Shoreline. A 'manufactured' Living Shoreline speeds up nature's work by adding materials to the cliff face that will allow the site to grow. At Camp Abegweit the former bare shoreline cliff is now an intricately woven structure that will trap seed, decompose, and create soil that nature will build on. This will provide much needed nutrients to seeds and plantings. The 'angle of repose' (the slope created by the debris) will deflect the wave action from pounding into the cliff and redirect the wind up instead of in. This deflection will prevent loss of soil and vegetation. On the upland you will find that dead and leaning trees have been felled and woven into 'brush walls' which, as they decay, will feed the newly planted seedlings and wildflowers. They will also deflect wind, and hold and store water to be slowly released between rain falls. This project is a work in progress. We will be constantly adding and building over the next 3-5 years, after which time the shoreline will be self-sufficient. It may look like a pile of trees, hay, leaves, seaweed and brush but Helping Nature Heal (HNH) has 14 years of research and practical experience that they applied to this cliff face. Rosmarie Lohnes (HNH owner) has been an amazing mentor and guide throughout this process. Watching her dedicated

crew work over two days to produce the first step in this Living Shoreline was a sight to behold. Educational Day with Summerside Intermediate School



We started off the fall by partnering with BBEMA and the Island Preserve Company to host an environmental education day for the grade 7 class from Summerside Intermediate School on September 18. The class came out to the beautiful Gardens of Hope in New Glasgow for a day of outdoor learning and exploration. The students rotated through four stations: aquatic ecosystems and the health of our rivers, plant identification, BBEMA's tag and release program with Monarch butterflies, and the butterfly house. The students were very engaged in the activities, taking notes and pictures for a class project that they completed based on their observations throughout the day. We had excellent weather and are very grateful for the use of such a beautiful location. We hope to continue to develop this education opportunity and others like it in the future.

GREAT CANADIAN SHORELINE CLEANUP

On Saturday, October 10th, WRIG partnered with the Hunter-Clyde Watershed Group and the Island Nature Trust to take part in the 2015 Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup. We walked along the Barachois Beach, the large sandbar that stretches across the area between the North Rustico harbour and Robinson's Island, to collect garbage and fishing equipment that had washed ashore. We collected a total of 27 kg of garbage during the cleanup. Overall the beach looked fantastic, thanks to visitors that help keep the beach beautiful and safe by cleaning up after themselves and others! The Barachois Beach is well-known to locals and is a relatively quiet beach making it an excellent location for observing several species of shorebirds, peaceful walks by the ocean, and enjoying time in the sun during the summer months. This beach was also home to three pairs of nesting piping plovers this summer—their nesting areas were marked, protected, and monitored by the Island Nature Trust. The piping plover is an internationally endangered shorebird that returns to PEI each spring to nest on our sandy beaches. You can improve their chances of survival each year by helping to ensure that their marked nesting areas remain undisturbed.
